Message from Ian Wilson, Librarian and Archivist of Canada

The year 2008 has been an exciting one for Library and Archives Canada (LAC), and I know I share with the Friends a real sense that we are now recognized as a major cultural institution in Canada. Transforming the elements of two former national icons with a new 21st-century profile has resulted in a world-class knowledge organization. As the new President of the International Council of Archives, I have discovered firsthand how well respected we are abroad, as well as nationally.

LAC attracted a great deal of attention in August at the 74th Conference of the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) held in Quebec City. More than 4,000 library and information professionals from 120 countries gathered to discuss global information challenges which have an enormous impact on our society. Suddenly local Canadian libraries became international superstars, as they shared their successes while a global audience assembled to hear how LAC was approaching issues like open source library systems, the management of electronic resources, and the question of copyright in the digital age.

These are exciting times. LAC launched in August the publication *Reaching Out: Innovations in Canadian Libraries*, with our partner Bibliothèque et Archives nationales du Québec. This book illustrates just how innovative Canada's libraries really are, providing world class models of community outreach, collaboration and partnerships, user-centered services and cutting edge technologies. LAC also released *Access*, a new publication which profiles our wide range of programs and services.

And thanks to the Friends' involvement, we have continued to raise funds for the acquisition of rare and valuable library and archival materials. In 2008, LAC was able to purchase the balance of the Peter Winkworth collection. The LAC collection continues to evolve as we acquire more digital materials and digitize existing collections to reach more Canadians.

These are the examples the Friends can take to Canadians as they work tirelessly at being our most important ambassadors. Whether it is through the ever-popular Kaleidoscope lecture series or the annual used book sales, in negotiations for a new acquisition or in general conversations, the Friends spread the word that we are fast becoming one of the most important forces for growth, change and discovery in today's knowledge economy.

I thank you for your many achievements and wish you continued success in the coming years.
